

A Synopsis of the **CITIZENS' REPORT**

on Budgets and Projects of the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC)

Introduction

he Niger Delta region is the storehouse of Nigeria petroleum resources. As the oil-producing region, the Niger Delta is the primary source of revenue for all the tiers of government in Nigeria. However, rather than being a blessing to the people, oil and gas production has resulted in massive environmental degradation, with colossal levels of ground, water and air pollution. Massive impoverishment and human rights abuses and the lack of access to health, education, energy and other social infrastructure contributed to creating communal protests and degenerated into armed militancy.

As part of the effort to address the rising tension and restiveness in the region, the Nigerian government established the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) in the year 2000 as the institutional vehicle to drive the region's development.

However, two decades after the NDDC was established, the federal agency failed to achieve its mandate satisfactorily. Corruption, complacency and impunities by people who supposedly should oversight the activities of the Commission have contributed in no small measure to its lacklustre performance.

To appreciate the depth of crisis and challenges of the NDDC, this report provides a synopsis of the analysis conducted on the operation on NDDC using its 2019 Approved Capital Budget.

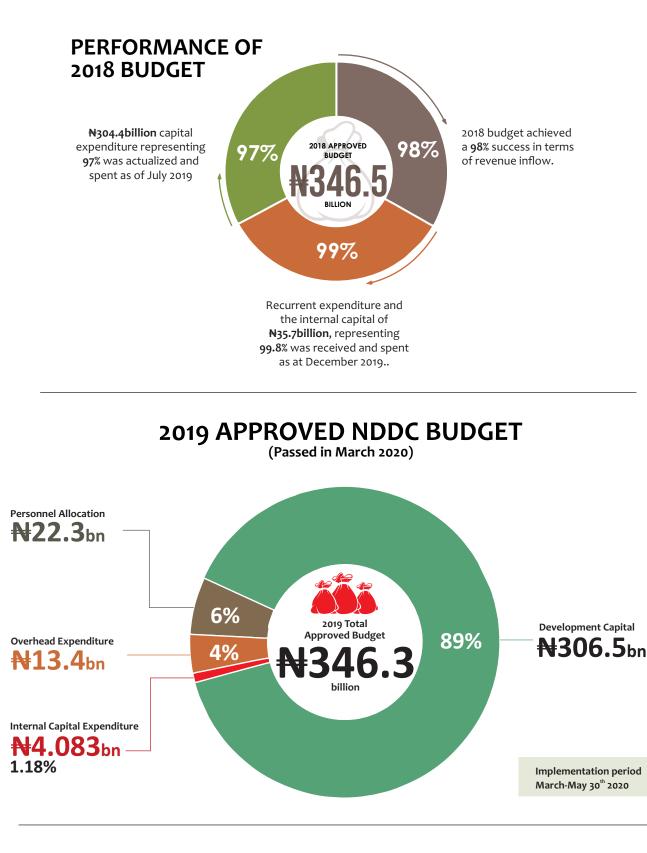
CORRUPTION is the primary factor responsible for the failure of NDDC. The following issues are causes or consequences of corruption in federal agency:

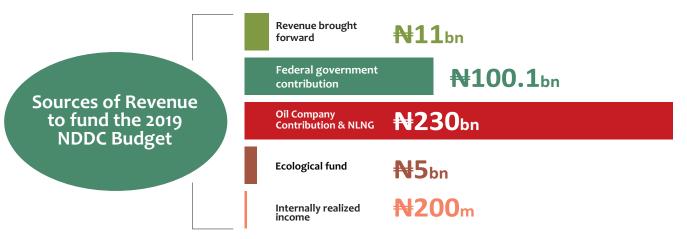

- Poor Oversight and Supervision of the Commission by the Presidency, the Ministry of Niger Delta and the National Assembly..
- Budget and Fiscal Secrecy
- Delay in Annual Budget Passage
- Violation of Procurement Laws and Standards
- Projects Abandonment
- Massive Debts to Contractors and Non-payment for Contracts Award
- Questionable Fund Allocation Trend
- Skewed Budgetary Allocations
- Over Ambition and Unrealistic Projects Pursuits
- Failure to publish and Act on the Forensic Audit emboldens corruption

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

- Overhauling of the NDDC by constituting the substantive board.
- Improve legislative and administrative oversight of the commission.
- Ensuring open budget and transparency of operation (institute open contacting process)
- Periodic, Regular and independent audit of the Commission
- Strengthening community engagement and participation in budgeting and project implementation processes.
- Strict Adherence to Zero base budgeting approach and prioritization of projects based on actual community needs.
- Strict adherence to procurement processes, laws and standards
- Multi-stakeholder partnership to constantly monitor the activities of NDDC
- Active monitoring of financial and procurement activities of the NDDC by anti-graft agencies.
- Decisive action by the president on the Forensic Audit report and the prosecution of corrupt officials and contractors.

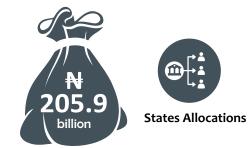

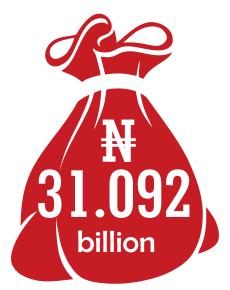

FRIVOLOUS EXPENDITURE INSIDE THE REGIONAL ALLOCATION

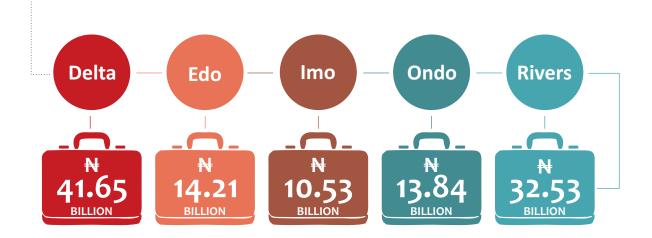

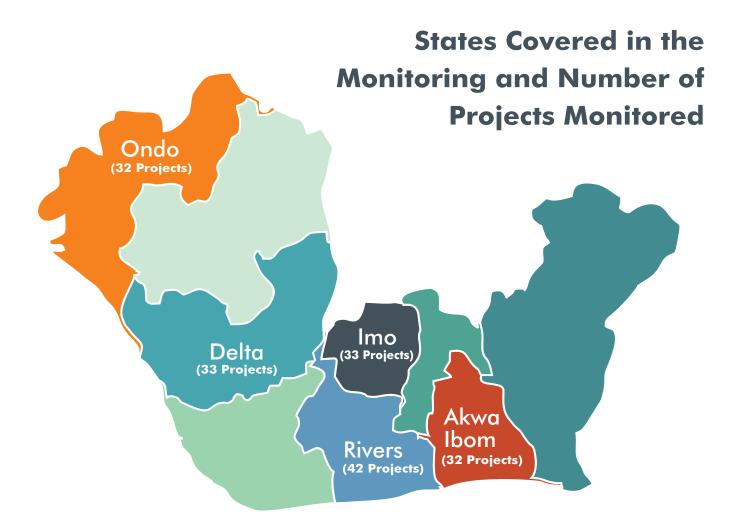

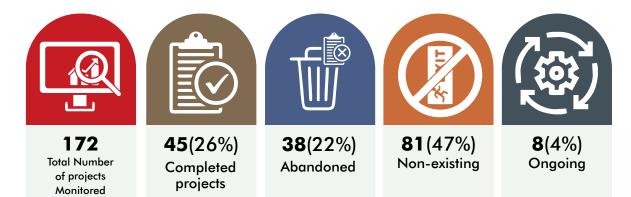
